



wound could be taken care of by stitches at the Emergency room, or



- 1.Stitches
  - 2.Steri-strips
  - 3.Glue
  - 4.Tape






first aid at home, and used these "rules of thumb:"

- Over 2" consider stitches
- Under 1" first aid
- 1-2" use judgment

He then showed good ways of removing splinters and the tools that are available for that purpose, such




as hypodermic needles, tweezers, and disposable scalpels, all of which are available on-line and without a prescription. Following that, eye injuries were discussed



and instructions for washing out one's eye were given, along with




the location of particles that might be safely removed at home, and the location of those mandating profes-



sional help.

Major injuries, which cannot be treated with first aid involve basi-



cally two steps. First, stop the bleeding and then arrange someone else to drive you to the hospital. If there has been an amputation, put the amputated part in a zip lock bag for transport. Contrary to common belief, the part does not need to be put on ice. Lastly, Dr. Sullivan suggested first aid supplies for the



shop, and closed with an involved question and answer period.



To: All AAW Affiliate Local Chapters

We are pleased to inform you that a resolution has been achieved that will restore general liability insurance coverage for our AAW Chapters.

Effective by or before Tuesday, February 19th, 2013, the AAW will have bound coverage for a new commercial general liability policy. This will restore coverage in the AAW policy for all Chapters.

The terms and conditions of this policy were negotiated deliberately to obtain the best possible coverage for the AAW, for our AAW members and for our approved AAW Chapters.

However, the premium cost for this coverage has escalated significantly and the AAW will no longer be able to fully subsidize the cost of extending coverage to our Chapters.

An annual contribution of \$90 from each chapter willing to participate in the insurance plan will be required. We are allowing a 60-day grace period for Chapters to determine whether they will want to participate.

You do not need to do anything at this point to be included - all approved Chapters will immediately be insured when the coverage is bound and will remain insured during the 60-day grace period.

We are preparing a detailed description of the insurance coverage, limits and conditions, and will send it to you by Tuesday, February 19th. This information will also be available on the AAW website.

With this message we are including a one-page, <u>side-by-side comparison</u> of the features of this new AAW insurance policy and the optional policy plan previously made available.

### Tips & Tricks

#### **Extended Chuck Jaw** Change, made Easier, by Jim Gott

I have a Vicmarc VM 100 chuck, and one of the sets of jaws I use are the Extended Dovetail Jaws. These are deep jaws in which four of the eight mounting screw



holes are fairly deep, making locating the hex recess with the hex key difficult at the bottom of the deep hole when I want to remove the jaws. For years I have been frustrated with this situation, until one day I had finally had enough. I made myself a simple fixture that solved the problem. I mounted a piece of maple in my chuck



and turned a cylinder 3/4" diameter, and protruding about 2" from the chuck. Next, I drilled a 9/64 hole about 2" deep



through the blank using a drill chuck in the tailstock. The hex key for these jaw screws is 3mm, so 9/64 leaves just enough




wiggle-room for the hex wrench to slide through the hole the jaws. Next, I reduced the 3/4" cylinder to 3/8" diameter, leaving Jim Gott a 1/8" X 3/4" cap on the end. This cap allows easy insertion and retraction of the



fixture. The 3/8 diameter fits perfectly in the deep jaw holes with enough wiggleroom for easy insertion and retraction. Next, I parted off the fixture leaving it 1-3/8" long under the cap. Done! To use the fixture, I simply insert it into the deep hole until the cap is seated, and

then insert the 3mm hex wrench, and finding the 3mm hex recess in the mounting screw is a snap. No more frustration!




