January Meeting Notes


Welcome to our Guests, Don Tewalt, Steve Wood and our New Member, Bob Nakano. Welcome and we hope you enjoyed being with us at our January club meeting.

Part 1-Show and Tell:



We had four members bring items to share with us for show and tell. Ace Foster brought in a piece of Walnut to show us what a chamber pith looks like. It was one of the questions raised from last month's presentation and is one of the ways to identify wood. Jim Gott brought in a very nice bowl made of "Anegre" and walnut. He didn't plan on using two woods; he cut a little too much off the bottom and replaced the miscalculation with the walnut. Nice save, Jim. Lou Gonzalez brought in two of his first bowls. Lou has been attempting to

practice woodturning for the last two years and have been collecting and making all sorts of tools. Well he finally turned a bowl to bring in and show. Two nice Acacia bowls he turned with his Ellsworth bowl gouge. Ron Newcomb brought in a variety of different Pens, Pencils, and Perfume Pens he



turned from Osage Orange, Yellow Heart, Walnut, Zebra wood and etc. You name it and Ron had it. He said the Ladies really go for the Perfume Pens and they are a good seller. Lou came back up with a tool item. A lot of us use power-sanding discs to finish our work. Lou showed one can adapt an inexpensive 6-inch sanding disc brought from MSC to a Makita. One does have to change the threaded adapter to metric to fit the Makita.

Part 2 - President's Challenge: (An ODD Thing)



We had four entries for the President's challenge. Craig Thorson brought in something special. It was a shallow bowl with a carving of a house and stream. The carving was done with a power carver. Jim Gott made a "Wall Sculpture". He turned a board of African Mahogany with concentric rings and then cut strips across the work. He then offset the pieces and glued it that way. Rich Johnson brought in some offcenter turnings made of walnut. He showed how he did this with a piece of wood mounted to the lathe with an attachment face at an angle to the rotation. Gary Petretti brought in an olive branch with the top turned into a goblet. Leaving the base as nature designed it.

Safety Chair (Stan Silva)

Stan gave quite a comprehensive report on shop safety. He handed out pamphlets on Chain Saw Safety and First Aid for Wood Turners. His talk stressed a Common Sense approach to the use of tools and material when we turn wood. If we are injured, to not panic, to have a shop first aid kit handy, and to seek help. Always remember to wear eye protection, and the use of a dust mask. Stan went over what to do in case of Burns, Contusions (Bruises), Sprains, Abrasions, Splinters, Amputations, Fractures, and Eye Injuries. Thanks Stan.

We will have some of the Safety handouts available at the next meeting.

AAW Collaborative Project

The AAW Collaborative Turning for next year! Lou Gonzalez is the Chairperson for this project. Project selection was made and the club will be making a wooden Nine Cylinder Radial Aircraft engine, circa 1910. This was changed from the one that powered the Spirit of Saint Louis to a World War I French LaRone nine cylinder engine. Reason? We have a drawing we can use for the LaRone while the others were in metric and too complex.

Home and Garden Shows

Latest Up-Date on Home & Garden; Here's the deal; \$300 worth of turnings and we pay for the electrical charge of \$75. We do not pick which turnings; we will try the voucher system. The Clubs give up their commission charge, but need to take a percentage of the total sales to pay the \$75 electrical fee. (Clubs did take in about \$150 on commission charge). At latest count for Jan. Show, Twelve sellers would share \$375 cost, with the idea it would come out of their sell receipts, or anything over \$31 would be profit. What ever the Show chooses from the works for sell, that turner will receive that value from the \$300 vouched. If you do not sell enough to cover the shared cost, you would owe the sponsoring Club the difference. Please remember! Where else can you display and sell your work for three days for about \$10 per day.

Part 5 -Old Business:

Wood Turning Classes:

Bob DiVita and Don Bonnett hold beginner woodturning classes at Bob's house. This is a closed class and you must call or see Bob or Don to get in. The idea is to provide basic instruction for new to woodturning members for three to four sessions, then you leave and others then come in.

Part 7 - This Month's Presentation:



This month's presentation was on "How to turn a Sphere", by Bob Morelli. Bob mentioned the only special tool he uses to turn spheres is a live center with a piece of wood over the point to make a flat face and a chucking fixture made from scrap wood. The chucking fixture is a piece of wood on the power end of the lathe with a dished out center to cup the round work piece. The tools he uses are a roughing gouge, a parting tool, a bowl gouge, and a hand saw. He starts with a square piece of wood about 1/3 longer than wide. Sets the starting lathe speed at 400RPM for a 6 to 8 inch piece. You will turn the lathe speed up to a speed your comfortable with after roughing is done. Turn the piece to a cylinder using the roughing gouge. Now he makes the cylinder length the same as the diameter by marking the center of the work piece with a lead pencil while its rotating.

Measure out from the

center line, ½ the diameter to each end. Using the parting tool, remove waste down to about 1¼ inch. Then mark two lines about ½ inch from the centerline, one on one side and the other on the other side of center. These are used as reference marks when you start to round off the cylinder ends. Round cylinder ends with bowl gouge and use parting tool to trim the two end tenons down to about ½ inch. Do not remove reference marks, if you did, remark. This is axis number one. Remove work from lathe and saw off most of tenons, leave some, this will be trimmed off in next operation. Now install chucking fixture and flat face live center. Position work in fixture as to have reference center line centered on chuck and live center. The tenons should be in the middle of rotating piece. Turn away the tenons until the cut approaches the reference lines. Now mark a second set of lines, one in the center and the others ½ inch on either side of the new centerline. You should have two places where old reference lines cross the new ones. Turn away excess material while watching



the lines. Rotate and repeat the process until the work is round. By rotating the work, you are removing the material by an averaging method, which tends to a near perfect sphere. The sanding is done in the exact same way. Sand and rotate, sand and rotate, etc. You can see Bob's method by visiting his Web Site at http://home.pacbell.net/renrut and click on "project".

Fruit Crumble Recipe

This recipe had been requested a number of months ago, it has been used for many years in Sandra Rude's family, taking advantage of whatever fruit is in season.

For the topping:

- 1 cup sugar (white or light brown or a combination)
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup (1 cube) butter, softened
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon each spices of your choice (nutmeg, clove, allspice, etc.)

For the filling:

- Fruit of your choice, peeled, cored, and sliced if appropriate (see note below)
- Instant tapioca (optional see note below)

Procedure:

- Thoroughly mix the topping ingredients together. My granny used a pastry cutter; I use a food processor. Set aside.
- Peel, core, and slice apples or stone fruit. For berries, just rinse briefly and dry on paper towels.
- Fill a Pyrex baking dish (approximately 9x9x2 or 8x12x2) with fruit to within 1/2 inch of top.
- Distribute topping over fruit. Sprinkle cinnamon over topping. The topping will be crispier if you also sprinkle with water, just enough to moisten the topping well.
- Bake at 350-375 for 30-45 minutes. The crumble is done when the fruit is bubbling rapidly and the topping is golden brown. Serve hot or warm or room temperature, with or without ice cream.

Note:

The original recipe is for 100% apples, but you can use any fruit that is in season. Stone fruit such as peaches or nectarines can be used by themselves or they combine well with apples. You can also mix apples with fresh boysenberries or Fuyu persimmons, or with a cup of dried cranberries or cherries.

The tapioca is not needed if you use 100% apples. However, for fruit that is runny when cooked, such as berries or peaches, you'll end up with fruit soup unless you mix some tapioca with the fruit. 'Some' will vary, from a tablespoon for peaches to 3 or 4 tablespoons for 100% berries.
