



First Aid in the Shop

Patrick Sullivan, M.D. was the guest speaker at the July meeting and his presentation was “First Aid in the Woodshop”. His no-nonsense approach is based both on years of medical practice and first hand experiences from being a lifelong wood worker. He presented four cardinal rules for dealing with cuts:



Wash the wound area thoroughly




Stop the bleeding

Direct Pressure

5 Minutes

Continuously



Close the wound

Closing Options:

1. Stitches
2. Steri-strips
3. Glue
4. Tape



Cover the wound




Along with well produced slides, Patrick explained the rationale behind each step and threw a lot of cold water on myths, misconceptions and questionable advertising claims.

Being that it is important to know when you should seek medical attention, Patrick gave specific examples of the type of injuries that should not be left to your own devices.

Stitches or First-Aid

ER? Home?

Location
Depth
Length



Good Rule of Thumb

- Over 2", consider stitches
- Under 1", first aid
- In between 1-2", use your judgment

Splinters are a fact of life for anyone working with wood and that area was also well covered.

First Aid in the Shop, continued

While burns may not be as common an injury for wood workers as, say, for glassblowers, Patrick did have sound advice on how to deal with minor burns.

Small Burns

Heat spreads surprisingly slowly through tissue:

- It is slow to heat up
- It is slow to cool down

Small Burns

Burn damage continues for minutes after the heat is removed.

Even though the surface starts cooling immediately, the deeper cells remain hot

Heat from those deeper cells slowly spreads to even deeper cells.

Small Burns

Immediately immerse in very cold water for 10 minutes or more

- Greatly reduces the pain
- May limit the extent of the burn

Small Burns

No good evidence that burn ointments are effective



Eye injuries can happen, well, in the blink of an eye and Patrick gave examples of what you may do at home and when to seek professional help.

Eye Injuries

made very simple

Sullivan's First Law

“Never, never, never take a chance with your eyes”

When in doubt, see the doctor


You must see a doctor if you have:

- Any penetrating injury to the eyeball
- Deep cuts to the eyelids
- Loss of vision
- Intense eye pain

Stuff in your eyes
that does not belong there

- Dust
- Wood shavings
- Grinder grit
- Metal fragments
- Paint, varnish





In the case of an amputation it is imperative to stop the bleeding and get to an emergency room. Bring all the bits and pieces with you if possible, but they may still be viable up to hours later, so don't discard any.

1 Stop the Bleeding

2 Transport to ER

Ambulance?

Patrick concluded by illustrating a well stocked first aid kit and a reminder that most shop accidents are preventable by paying attention to the task at hand and not doing anything stupid.

Quote from most shop accident victims:





FUNGUS IN WOOD: This article was lifted “as published” from the CFA web site. It should interest every wood turner and anyone who regularly processes wood. Note the relevance to Redgum, Bluegum and Blackwood; timbers that woodturners love to use for fancy turned articles. **TAKE NOTE OF THE SYMPTOMS, tell your doctor you are often exposed to wood dust and keep a good dust mask (sealed in a plastic sandwich bag) in the boot of your vehicle at all times.**

CFA VOLUNTEER WARNS OF FUNGUS IN FIREWOOD.



Glenaladale CFA volunteer John Hine was faced with a battle last year, one he never saw coming. This time last year John was cutting up the annual supply of Redgum wood on his farm in Woodglen. John had no idea he was inhaling a small fungus that lives in some timbers. The substance is in form of a white powder that when disturbed becomes airborne. John said a few weeks after cutting the firewood he began to feel sick.

“I started experiencing symptoms such as muscle aches, fever, sweating and headaches so severe no amount of Nurofen or Panadol could help me,” said John.

Initially it was thought that John had lung cancer as chest X-rays and CT scans revealed a shadow on the lungs.

“I was referred to the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre in Melbourne for further scans and a bed was set aside for immediate transfer to the Royal Melbourne Hospital.

“It was soon discovered that in fact I didn’t have cancer but a rare fungus infection which has spread from my lungs into spinal fluid and into the brain.

The rare fungal infection is called Cryptococcal Fungus. The illness is very uncommon and on average 6 to 10 Victorians are diagnosed with infection every year.

“An intense medical treatment plan was administered including daily intravenous therapy of anti-fungal fluid by a team of specialist doctors and nurses.

“The treatment really flattened me, after my release I returned weeks later. It’s been a really long journey which all started exactly 12 months ago. It’s not completely gone yet, fingers crossed I can beat this.

The strain of fungus John inhaled is most commonly found in Redgum, but other strains exist in other timbers including Blue gum, and Blackwoods.

John shares his story so that others may learn. John said simple precautionary steps could have been taken like wearing a face mask.

“Our family and friends keep a pack of respirators on hand now; I hope I can educate others about the risk.

“I’m a self-employed farmer and CFA volunteer who drives the fire truck. I never even knew of Cryptococcal Fungus until I caught this illness.

“I just want to thank my family and my wife Carmel who has been by my side and seen me through ups and downs.

“Also a huge thanks to Glenaladale Brigade volunteers especially Captain Rick and Secretary Vicki O’Haire.”

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
