Don Bonnett's elegant goblets

SVW member and cabinetmaker Don Bonnet came to our December meeting to demonstrate his technique for turning long stemmed goblets.

Don cautioned us to start with dry, straight grained wood, or the stems can warp. Sharp tools are a must as well, to minimize cutting forces on delicate stems.

Don began his talk by showing a set of

five goblets, in different woods and graduated sizes. He says that about 95% of the goblets he turns now make it to completion, but that wasn't always the case.

Don selected a blank of maroon Madagascar rosewood, and used a home made scribe to mark the center on each end of the blank. He gripped a Steb drive center in his chuck on the lathe, then mounted the blank

Phil Roybal showed a maple star ornament, hand carved, power textured, then finished with Watco and wax.





Mike Magrill sent, in absentia, an English walnut bowl, intended to be filled with Christmas candy as a decoration.


Rich Johnson showed a group of bells, made of Micronesian ivory nuts, with wooden clappers.

Rich Johnson showed a walnut burl bowl, cored from a large chunk. It's a work in progress.


Phil Roybal brought one of the Andi Wolfe style scrapers he's been making for various club members.

Becky Frisbee got her Carbatec lathe two weeks ago and has been turning perfume pens, which she finished with Crystal Coat.

Tony Bryhan presented a podocarpus open bowl finished with tung oil. He also brought a walnut burl bowl.

Rich Dege showed us a scroll sawn Woodturning Demo sign we can use for our show demos.

Mike Wiley brought several pen and pencil sets of various burls.

between centers and roughed it round. He turned a dovetailed tenon on the chuck end of the piece, then removed the Steb center and gripped that tenon in his chuck. The free end of the piece wobbled off center a bit, so he levered it up as it spun with a tool passing over the tool rest and under the workpiece. This trued it up.

Next, Don used a spindle gouge to hollow the inside of the cup, plunging the gouge into the center and cutting back against the walls. He cuts at the top and back of the cavity, bringing it to final form. There's some chatter in this operation, due to the small chuck and long overhang. He finishes with a round nose scraper. He hones his scrapers to a razor edge, but does not use a burr because burrs will grab in such hard wood.

With the inside complete, Don begins to shape the outside of the goblet bowl with a spindle gouge. He pauses frequently to feel for even thickness along the goblet wall as he goes.

With most of the bowl shaped, inside and out, Don rough sands the bowl of the goblet. He then completes



Left: Shaping the goblet's bowl. Top: finishing the bowl and stem top. Right: ready to part off. Below: working along the stem.




the outside shape and finish sands to #800 or #1200, inside and out. He finishes the bowl with shellac, and rubs it with steel wool to get rid of any streaks. Finally, he rubs a wax block over the bowl and buffs it with a rag at high speed.

Now comes the tricky part. An inch or so at a time, Don turns the stem to

final size, then sands and finishes it. When the bowl begins to vibrate, he stuffs it with toilet paper and brings the tailstock up to support it.

Finally, he turns a smooth transition between the bottom of the stem and the base, which he likes to make a little larger in diameter than the rim of the bowl. He final sands the base and finishes it, then parts off the goblet with a narrow parting tool. He pauses with the base half parted off to sand the bottom of it and apply finish.

He's made 40-50 of these goblets, and has built his skills to the point where he can make it look easy.

Great demo, Don!



President's Challenge Entries, 2001-2004




Last year, we tried a new approach to boost participation in the President's Challenge.


