
Message From the President

The month of July was filled with two club activities. First we had our meeting on the second Wednesday, followed by the club picnic 10 days later, and then our August Board of Directors meeting another 10 days after the picnic. Once again our members are producing some great turnings. For those who missed the picnic, you missed out on a good time.

On July 31 there was a Board of Directors meeting. This was a short meeting where we discussed the progress of nominations for 2013 Officers and the club storage challenge. Nominations for 2013 Officers are still short nominations for all positions. Herb Green has been working to fill all the positions and feels he has exhausted his efforts. Let's give Herb some help, if you are willing to serve as a club officers or want to nominate a member for an officer position please contact Herb.

The Board made a decision to request from the membership at the August meeting for approval to spend \$1,500 for an enclosed trailer to resolve the club storage issue. At the August meeting, there was a discussion regarding how to resolve the storage problems. The ideas presented were: dispose of the items needing storage (lathe, tools, table, etc.), ask members to store the items, or to purchase an enclosed trailer. The disposal was not well accepted. There was the possibility of members storing some of the items, but leaving access a question. The storage of an en-



closed trailer was resolved with Marcus Moody, volunteering the storage in the same RV storage yard as his trailer is stored. The membership voted, and approved the purchase of a trailer for not more than \$1,500, while we continue to pursue other solutions.

Our Treasurer, Grant Beech reported there was \$2,100 in the bank, as of the August meeting. Dean Akins notified me that the profit sharing from the AAW Symposium was \$1,627, which would be mailed to Grant within the week. That will place the club balance at \$3,727.

I am still awaiting formal confirmation of our tax exemption status. The Nor Cal Woodturners club in Sacramento filed a couple week before us, and they have not hear anything either.

The September Presidents Challenge is "A tray not a platter or plate". What is a tray if not a platter? Well it must have a height to allow a person to easily grip an area to lift and carry the tray. A tray must be of a design to keep items on the tray from falling or sliding off. Have a great time with this challenge and be safe. October's challenge is fluted.

Secrets to Creating Two-Piece Hollow Forms With Brian McEvoy, #161

From the SVW Library

Many of us have seen hollow forms impossibly wide for their height, and wondered how we could make such things. Brian McEvoy took his inspiration from ceramics and developed a technique to easily make such objects. He turns them in two pieces, then glues them together into a single turning with a seam almost impossible to spot. Here's how he does it. One of Brian's favorite woods for such projects is yellow cedar, aged for many



months. He begins by re-sawing a 3" slab in two. He traces circles on each piece and bandsaws them round. He then attaches faceplates to each half, on what will be-



come the inside face of the piece. Brian does most of his work with bowl gouges. He says, "As long as you can turn a couple shallow platters, you can do this project." He mounts the first piece on the lathe and turns the outside with sweeping pull cuts. Then he forms the rim. He turns in a slight dovetail he can use later to re-

mount the piece for hollowing. Next, Brian turns the base. It's just like the



top except for a shallow foot. This is exactly like turning a shallow bowl or deep platter. Again he turns a slight dovetail, into which he can expand a chuck when he



remounts. He remounts his pieces and trues them up, then turns them to about 1/16" wall thickness. He carefully trues the rims because



they'll have to be glued together later in a (hopefully) invisible joint, then works his way down to the final wall thickness, an inch at a time.

He glues the top and bottom together with yellow glue, carefully matching the grain so it looks like a single piece of wood. He relies upon the lathe as his clamp, insuring that the two pieces will be accurately centered as he clamps them together.

Once the glue's dried, he sands the piece



on the lathe. Then, he's ready to pierce and woodburn, or just apply a finish. Production values are very good, and this is a nice explanation of technique.

Compressed Air Back-up

What do you do after your air compressor fails, you want to spend some time researching new compressors, but still are addicted to the benefits of compressed air to blow off sanding dust & grit, blow dust out of all the nooks and crannies in the shop, spray finishes, air nailing, etc.?



If you have access to SCUBA gear, throw a regulator on a tank, get a 1/4" npt adapter to the low pressure inflator hose, and attach to your shop air line, and you are back in business. The SCUBA regulator first stage reduces the 3000-3500 psi tank pressure to 125 psi, which is enough for most applications, and could be regulated lower to extend tank life. The typical tank holds 80 cu ft of air at standard temperature and atmospheric pressure, and lasts quite a while.



It's not a good long-term solution. Paying for tank refills, and transporting the tanks is more costly and inconvenient. Out of necessity, air for diving is extremely clean, oil-free, and very dry. It is much

more compact than my old 20-30 gallon tank compressor, and portable! This set-up has confirmed that my previous air leaks were in or at the compressor, and not my other fittings, which is good.

I really don't miss the repetitive drone of the compressor recharging incessantly in my shop. The next compressor is going outside the shop!





Air Compressor Recall

The pressure switch on my air compressor has been acting funny for a while, so when it failed completely (couldn't turn the compressor on at all) it was not a big surprise. I removed the switch, dug out the manual so I could identify the part number to order, then went online to search for my brand & model of compressor (Charge Air Pro, CP0200E20). To my surprise, when I did the first thing that popped up was that it had along with lots of other names & models have been recalled for faulty air tanks. The recall notice gives a phone number to call, and you get 2 options:

1. is \$200 off toward selected models of Ingersoll-Rand air compressors, or
2. \$100 which you can then spend on any brand of compressor, or however you like.

I called the number, and talked to two very nice ladies which took my info, confirmed that my model was recalled, and arranged for a truck to come to my house and ship the compressor back to them to be destroyed, at no cost and very little inconvenience to me.

I took option 2, but that's a longer story. If you have an Ingersoll-Rand built compres-

WASHINGTON, D.C. - In cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), Ingersoll-Rand Company, of Woodcliff Lake, N.J., is voluntarily recalling about 458,000 portable air compressors sold between 1983 and 1991. Internal corrosion to the inner wall of the air receiver tank can cause the air tank to unexpectedly rupture allowing pressurized air to suddenly and forcefully escape, posing risk of injury to consumers.

Ingersoll-Rand has received 11 reports of sudden tank failure in these portable air compressors. No injuries have been reported.



The recalled portable compressors have single-phase electric motors up to 3hp or gasoline engines up to 8hp

with tank sizes up to 30 gallons. The compressors were marketed under various

brand names, including Ajax, Charge Air Pro, Energair, Guardian Power, MacTool, Power Force, Rallye, Rand 4000, and Steel Driver. The compressors have serial numbers beginning with the prefix "C" or "DC". The model numbers begin with the following prefixes - 1B, 1D, 1E, 1I, 2B, 2D, 2E, 3B, 3D, 3E, 4B, 4E, 5E, 5G, 15E, 23HP, 75, 75E, 250E, AB, AIR, AJ, C, CAP, CB, CL, CO, CP, CR, CS, CT, EA, GC, GP, HP, HPC, IR, IRC, LTD, MT, OI, PF, RA, RL, RP, RY, SC, SDS, SE, THP, and WB. Model and serial numbers are located on a plate or sticker attached to the outside housing of the air compressor. On some oil-less models, the model and serial numbers are affixed to an internal floor baffle beneath a removable plastic cabinet.

Hardware and construction supply stores nationwide sold the air compressors from 1983 through 1991 for between \$150 and \$400. ... (continues).

- Entries must not have been shown before.
- If you miss a month's Challenge, you may bring it to the following meeting.
- If you bring a make-up Challenge to a meeting, you must also show the current month's Challenge piece.
- Entries must be submitted online (Yahoo Groups, Database) no later than 4:00 PM the day of the meeting to be eligible. If you are unable to register, have a fellow member register for you. You have up to two (2) days after the meeting to modify or add to the descriptions in the database. What you say is what you get.
- The president may approve make-ups for extraordinary absence for hardships such as long term illness, or absence due to employment, provided all make-ups are made at the first meeting upon the member's return. Vacation is not accepted as a reason for more than one missed month.
