showed that the results can range from simple and practical to complex and whimsical. He defined terms such as bias, shadow, parallel intersecting and skewed axes. He then proceeded to demonstrate parallel,

As I See It.

If our first meeting of the year, on January 9th, was an indication, SVW is in for a good year. We had a very good turnout, about forty members. The meeting's feature attraction was an excellent demonstration by our own Brian Havens. He packed a complete course in multi-axis turning into 38 minutes, and went on to turn one more show-piece. Well done!

A dozen and a half entries in the president's challenge showed off our group's creativity and another dozen presentations during Show & Tell ranged from methods of work, hard fought and won battles with bowls and off axis turnings.

Rich Johnson leads the way by contributing a Fruitless Mulberry Hollow form to the Eagles. Thanks, Rich.

Looking back over the president's challenge list and remembering what was shown, I noticed something that I found interesting. All the entries that had thirteen "machined" features, in each case, were symmetrical. Even in the couple entries that were "12+1", the 12 features were evenly spaced around the vessel. Brian's casework base is symmetrical. What I find intriguing is that the challenge did not say anything about evenly spaced or symmetry... Whether it was flutes, flowers, holes or grooves, only thirteen were required, yet we all were drawn to symmetry or order.



Joel Smith, our newly minted Ways & Means Chairman, brought in and donated five nice wood pieces for a wood raffle. Don't be surprised if Joel puts a different twist on the wood raffle in coming months.

It appears that starting the meeting at 6:30 is agreeable to most folks. As with anything else, it's bound to work out well for some, and not so well for others. So, un-

less there is a groundswell of opposition, we will continue to start at 6:30, on the first Wednesday of the month.

Next month's president challenge is "Produce an Off Axis Turning", which is an excellent opportunity to put to use lessons learned from this month's demonstration. Our guest presenter in February is Patrick Sullivan M.D., discussing accidents in the workshop and how to deal with them.

One final thought on the president's challenge; as I see it, the whole idea here is to try something different. Get out of your safe zone and get a little uncomfortable. The emphasis is on a *little* uncomfortable. If it doesn't feel right, don't do it. But don't quit. Ask a mentor or the presenter who put this crazy idea in your head in the first place for help. Silicon Valley Woodturners is all about growing, and sharing, and having fun.

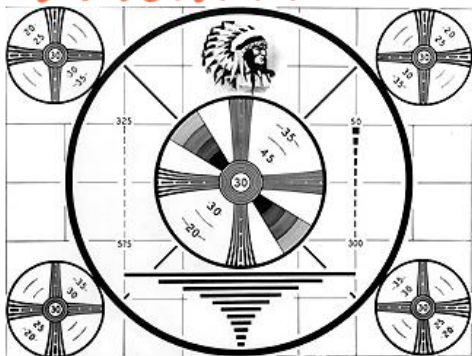

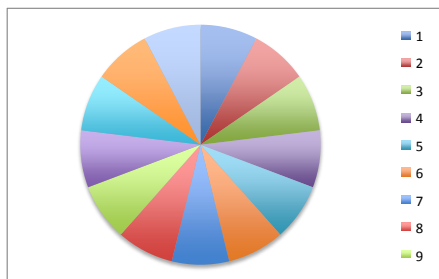


Tips & Tricks

Excel-ent way to Design Segments

number of segments you choose and you can then use that pie chart as a template; make it larger, smaller, etc.

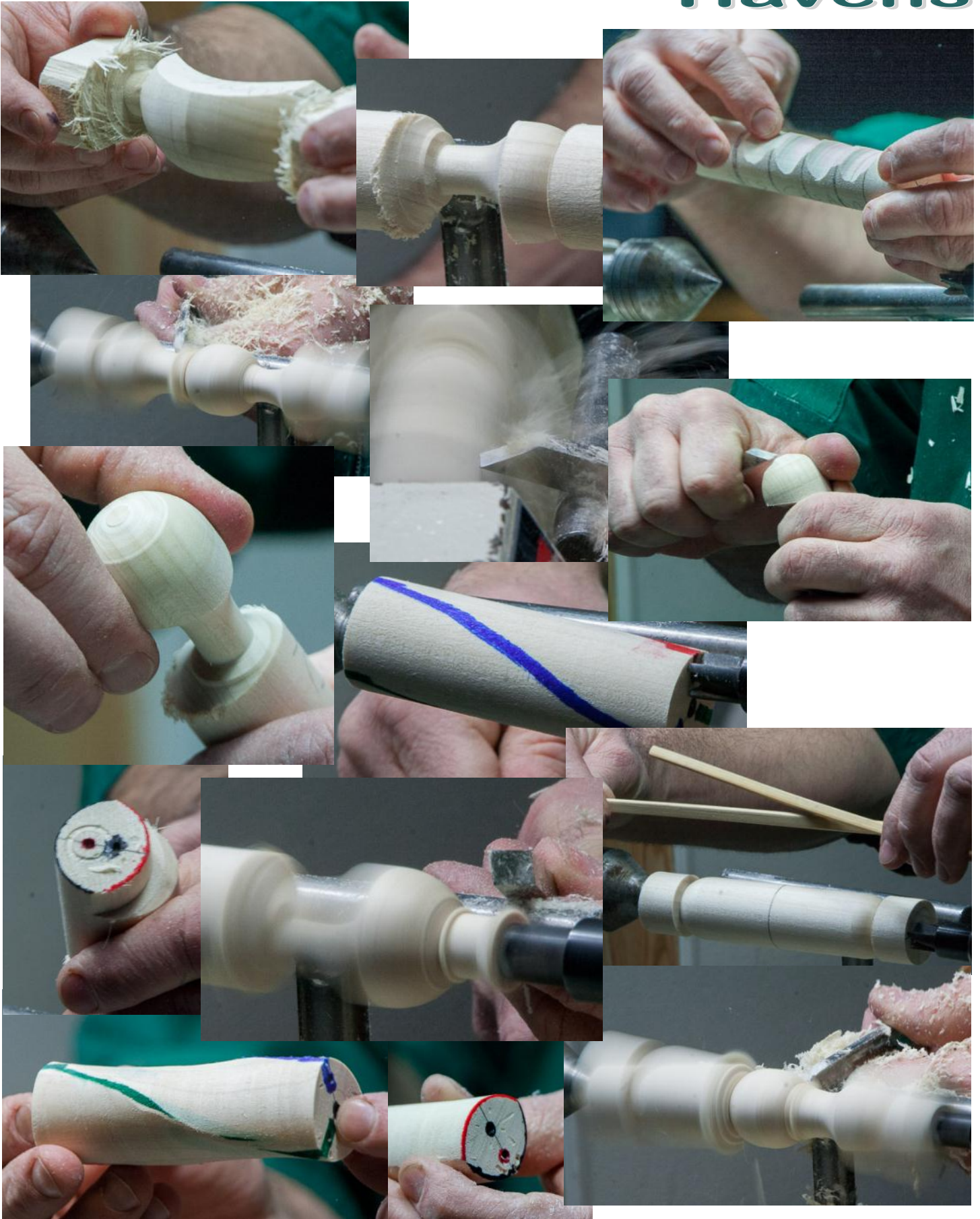

American Association of Woodturners

To: All AAW Affiliate Local Chapters

For more than 20 years, the American Association of Woodturners has purchased liability insurance that covered both AAW members and AAW chapters for any liability exposure arising from chapter-sponsored events.

In the latter part of 2012 we undertook an exhaustive review of all AAW corporate, member, and chapter insurance to write an insurance specification in order to solicit bids for 2013. This was also in response to a doubling in our general liability insurance premium in 2012. It has become evident to us that under terms of renewal, the policy offered through our existing carrier will no longer meet our terms and conditions for liability coverage to our chapters. By way of illustration, the cost to AAW for our chapters in 2011 was \$11,000. In 2012, that rose to \$23,000. Under new terms of proposed insurance for 2013, our premium would rise to more than \$175,000 to offer the same coverage to all chapters.

Although we have engaged two agents to independently identify a carrier willing to write a policy extending pre-existing liability insurance for our chapters, we have not yet identified a suitable and affordable policy. In effect, this means we are not able at this time to implement a policy that we can extend to each chapter affiliated with AAW. We are identifying other providers of optional general-liability coverage for the chapters and we are confident that we will very shortly be able to offer policy coverage at a competitive price. Accord insurance certificates sent on behalf of the AAW reflect coverage held by the AAW national organization. The national office will issue an update on the status of this process as soon as possible. Of course, chapters also may choose to seek liability coverage from providers in their local area.

We acknowledge that this information represents a substantial change to our longstanding practice of the AAW paying for the liability insurance as a way to support the work of our local chapters. We understand that this is an extremely disappointing development and we realize that a change of this nature does not come without some distress. We want to assure you that we are continuing a diligent search for the most affordable solution to this problem. As noted above, we will be issuing a more complete statement of options very soon, but in the meantime we will be available to answer your questions and get your feedback by phone or e-mail.

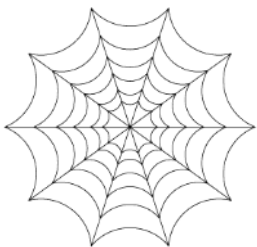

IRONMAN Rules

- Entries must not have been shown before.
- If you miss a month's Challenge, you may bring it to the following meeting.
- If you bring a make-up Challenge to a meeting, you must also show the current month's Challenge piece.
- Entries must be submitted online (Yahoo Groups, Database) no later than 4:00 PM the day of the meeting to be eligible. If you are unable to register, have a fellow member register for you. You have up to two (2) days after the meeting to modify or add to the descriptions in the database. What you say is what you get.
- The president may approve make-ups for extraordinary absence for hardships such as long term illness, or absence due to employment, provided all make-ups are made at the first meeting upon the member's return. Vacation is not accepted as a reason for more than one missed month.
