Part of the November meeting was devoted to a swap meet, with lots of tools and supplies changing hands. After that, our own Dick Pickering talked about his Nutcracker production run. He gave us a preview of this year's model: the American Westerner Matt Dillon.

Dick first showed a leprechaun nutcracker from 1998, so we could see what a finished product looked like. Then he told us how he makes them.

He starts with leg blanks, cut out on a bandsaw. He glues the pieces together, then refines them with a Foredom rotary carver.

Dick next makes the body and head as a spindle turning of poplar. The blank he uses is

glued up from two longer pieces with a spacer piece in the middle.



Natural Edge

Phil Roybal presented a camphor scoop with a natural edged handle, cradled in a steel stand. The scoop was colored with alcohol stains and finished with varnish.

Mike Magrill (in absentia) showed a cherry bowl finished with 50% Deft.

Herb Green showed a tristania crotch piece turned into a bowl, finished with #66 oil.

Dick Pickering brought in a red bark eucalyptus, natural edged, open bowl.

Rich Johnson turned a large walnut bowl with a deep foot, which he finished with 50% Deft.

Lloyd Frisbee showed off his first bowl, a mesquite natural edge turning, finished with Deft spray lacquer.

Bill Robinson presented a small bowl of spalted maple, finished with Deft.

Mike Rude showed a privit open bowl, finished with Deft.

Ayman Sayed brought in a maple burl bowl, finished with Deft.

Rick Parfitt presented a natural edged candle stand of redwood with hurricane shade. He also brought a makeup seasonal turning: a walnut candle holder. Both were finished with varnish.

Mike Magrill and Ayman Sayed won the President's Challenge raffle.


Show and Tell

Phil Roybal showed off the first of a small production run of Andi Wolf style scrapers, made of A2 steel with walnut handles, finished with oil and wax. He's selling them for \$45 each.

Rich Johnson burned flowers into a Red alder vase, colored them with Prismacolor pens, and finished the piece with oil.

Josh Salisan showed us some small ornamental boxes of African blackwood with snakewood inlays, threaded lids, and rose engine decorations inside.

Bill Robinson brought a small birch bowl, finished with 50% Deft.

This creates a U-shaped body. He hollows out the center of the turning with a large Forstner bit to create a rounded space for the moveable jaw. He then glues the leg assembly to the body.

The next step is to make the arms as spindle turnings. Once he's turned the arms, Dick cuts them on a 55° angle and reglues them to create bent "elbows". He then shapes hands on the ends of the arms, and drills them to hold accessories.

Dick makes the brim of Matt.

Dillon's "10-gallon" cowboy hat from a thin, flat piece of wood, then clips off the sides and glues them back at an angle to create rolled brim sides. He carves the boots to shape, then turns the eyes and plugs them into eye holes he's drilled into the head.

The last pieces to be made are the accessories. In this case, Dick's equipped his cowboy with a wooden six-shooter that features a revolving cylinder.

Dick carves his nutcrackers with Foredom or Dremel rotary carvers, then paints them, attaches "hair", and makes or paints onto them miniature costumes to fit their themes. It's a labor of love that takes him weeks, and the results are truly impressive.




