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Sharpening—with Rich Johnson, Jim Gott, and Mike Rude

Tonight, three veteran SVW members took the stage to talk about sharpening turning tools. Rich Johnson, Jim Gott, and Mike Rude each addressed a different aspect of this critical skill.

Rich Johnson started off by showing some of the old carbon steel tools he first turned with, sharpened by hand without jigs, back in his ShopSmith days. He said that when Jerry Glaser came out with the line of tools that bears his name, Glaser produced a floor standing sharpening fixture (somewhat like a modern Wolverine jig) to help his customers sharpen them properly.

Rich tried the Glaser setup, then replaced it with a Wolverine base and a

Vari-Grind tool holding jig. He settled on two profiles: a spindle grind and a bowl grind.

He and others soon identified a problem setting the Vari-Grind to an accurate angle so that a tool could be ground consistently. Soren Berger, Rich, and some others then came up with the idea of making sticks that would help set the Wolverine projection and Vari-Grind angle for each type of gouge. This approach was quick, cheap, and worked well, and many of us use it now. Rich also placed a 2" block by his grinder to use in setting the amount the gouge projects through the Vari-Grind.

In Australia, someone came up with an improvement on the Vari-Grind called the Uni-Jig. Rich carried this system for a short time, but abandoned it when he could not

President's Challenge

Phil Roybal brought a badge shaped like a miniature skew chisel, of maple, brass, and steel. He applied his name by heat transferring a xerographic image.

Dick Pickering also brought a badge shaped like a skew chisel, of steel and mahogany with a brass ferrule. He engraved his name with a Dremel tool.

Rich Johnson showed a pin-chuckshaped badge of wood. He woodburned his name into it.

Mike Rude brought in a frame for his paper badge. The sides were spindle turnings, split and mitered.

Lloyd Frisbee showed a badge that looked like an eye. He made it from a tagua nut with an inlay of thuya burl and blackwood. His name is applied with embossing powder.

Becky Frisbee made a tiny wooden platter, burned its edge, colored it with gel pens, and finished it with shellac.

Jim Gott brought a disc of claro walnut with a spalted maple inlay. He burned his name into the surface, and inlaid magnets into the back to attract a steel plate as a fastening.

Ayman Sayed made a maple badge in the shape of a hollow vessel, sliced it into a slab, then lettered the slab with a stencil.

Michael Wiley made a maple badge as a tiny platter with stick-on letters. He build an integral wood clip to slide inside a shirt pocket, and finished it with spray lacquer.

Rick Parfitt showed a badge of walnut in the shape of a skew chisel. He lettered it with puff paints.

Bob Bowers showed a small, round badge of mystery wood with a wipe-on poly finish. He printed out his picture, lettered it with Photoshop, and applied the composite to the badge.

Michael Wiley and Rick Parfitt won the President's Challenge raffle.

Show and Tell

Phil Roybal brought three of his scrapers, made from walnut or mahogany with steel and brass. They were finished with Watco and wax.

Dick Pickering showed off one of his Marshall Dillon nutcrackers, all painted and ready to go.

Rich Johnson presented the steel tool rests he's had made to his design, and is now selling at \$100 per set (4) rests). He also showed some of the name badges he's turned in past years.

Mike Rude showed off a 16" steady rest of Baltic birch with oak arms and in-line skate wheels. He designed it for his Stubby lathe.

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Lloyd Frisbee brought in a "Rich's Reject" bowl of tristania, finished with pecan stain.

Becky Frisbee showed us some compact mirror cases of padauk and walnut, finished with Crystal Coat and buffed with tripoli.

Jim Gott presented a turner's smock from Lee Valley. It's similar to the Craft Supply smock, but longer with long sleeves.

Ayman Sayed showed off a natural edged maple bowl, finished with 50% Deft wipe on lacquer.

Tony Bryhan presented a burl walnut bowl with three little feet, finished with tung oil.

Michael Wiley made a cherry, steel, and brass scratch awl, finished artist fixative and friction polish.








Top to bottom: The Wolverine base on a grinder, the Vari-Grind tool holder seated in the Wolverine base, and the Tru-Grind system.

get delivery commitments from the manufacturer. Soon after, he found the Tru-Grind jig, which he currently sells. This has larger capacity than the Vari-Grind and uses a different base. Rich has also come up with setting sticks for this system. He sells the Tru-Grind for about \$150. He uses the O'Donnell profiles which he got originally as wall charts from Craft Supplies. They don't supply them any longer.

Rich sharpens on a slow-speed, 8" grinder, with coarse wheel on one side and fine on the other. He roughs

out a grind on the coarse wheel, then sharpens on the fine one. He notes that a sharp edge is invisible: if you see a bright line at the edge when you look straight down on it, the tool isn't sharp. He says "If you're stone is dirty you're wasting your time". Use a diamond trueing tool to produce a sharp, clean, true stone.

Jim Gott took the stage next. He uses the Wolverine system and puts the same grind on both spindle and bowl gouges. He uses a wood block with a hole (and a penny in the bottom of the hole) to set the protrusion of the gouge through the Vari-Grind. He addresses the repeatability issue by scratching lines on the angle plate of the Vari-Grind to set the grinding angle, then uses sticks to set the position of the Wolverine base.

He grinds his bevels at 45°, then rounds off and draws the wings way back by rolling the Vari-Grind past 90°, as far as he can roll it, during

sharpening. This cuts off most of the wing. He also rounds the heels of his gouges to keep from bruising the wood inside bowls. He makes the initial grind, then sets the Vari-Grind as shallow as it will go and regrinds the heel about halfway up the bevel.

Jim uses a special grinder and tool rest for his skew chisels. He grinds a very slight radius on his skews, and grinds the bevels at around 55° included angle. He sharpens on a #120 wheel and doesn't hone the tools after grinding. He replaced the original grinder wheels with Norton wheels from Craft Supply, and they made a great difference in his grinding. He likes Crown Pro PM tools because they grind easily, and have a flute similar to the Henry Taylor Super Flute, with a little bit of a curve going down and a tighter radius at the bottom.

Mike Rude showed us a Tormak grinder. It turns a stone at 100 RPM through a water bath. He doesn't use it all the time because it is slow cutting, but uses it for skews and other tools where he wants a really fine edge. He uses a small attached leather wheel, saturated in mineral oil, to remove the burr from the inside of the flutes.

Mike uses a fingernail grind jig on the Tormak. This tool holder works rather like the Vari-Grind, and is one of a number of optional Tormak jigs for sharpening skews, scissors, knives, carving tools, and just about anything else. The Tormak also has a wheel trueing jig and a stone grader to alter the apparent grit of the wheel for coarse or fine grinding.

Mike recommends marking edge to be sharpened with a black Magic Marker before beginning the grind, so you can see where you're grinding.

It was an informative evening, and gave many of us some useful tips on how to improve our edge.

Woodcraft offers a rebate of 3% back to the club (good for 6 months)


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Shop Tour!


